## Assignment #3: Film-Based Argument

**Prompt:** Please watch and annotate the film *Slumdog Millionaire* so you can write an argument that answers ONE of these student-generated questions:

- o How did Jamal's relationships shape his worldview?
- o How did Jamal's childhood experiences shape his worldview?
- o How do the themes of poverty, violence, and mistrust impact Jamal?
- o Does wealth bring Salim and/or Jamal true happiness?
- O Did society or Salim's choices have the biggest influence on the person he became as an adult?
- What types of oppression are most evident in the film?
- o How does the film address the concept of different knowledges?
- o In what ways, if any, does America exploit children?
- How can the government prevent the sex trade from expanding in America?
- What is the efficacy of using torture to get information from a human being?

Genre: Research paper

Process Drafts: You will begin your first draft in class.

- Draft #1: 750-word source-based paper that uses informal citation of the film (to be included in midterm portfolio)
- Draft #2: 1,500-word source-based paper that uses formal citation (MLA or APA style) with at least four sources (if you choose to revise this piece and include in your final portfolio)

Purpose: To persuade.

**Audience:** Your primary audience is people who do not agree with your opinion/position. Your secondary audience is your teacher and other folks who visit your blog.

**Style:** A thesis-driven, source-based, argumentative text that uses a conversational and appropriate tone for your audience. Remember to use informal citations where you provide the titles and author names of reference materials. If you choose to write draft #2 for your final portfolio, please use either APA or MLA style to cite at least four separate sources.

**Focus:** Answer one of the questions provided in the prompt. Your argument can focus on one scene in the film, or one character's issues/worldviews, or one specific theme, or one specific definition—to give a few examples. In addition, you can choose to focus on a global issue that connects to a major theme in the film: this approach would reference the film in the beginning of the paper and then shift the focus away from the film and toward events in the real world.

**Thesis:** Your thesis statement must communicate the paper's central claim and use a topic, position, and support model (TPS). The thesis statement should be the last sentence in the introduction.

**Counter-argument/Rebuttal:** Please provide at least one counter-argument and rebuttal.
